As the Associate Director of Admissions for On Campus Events I was offered the opportunity to travel to Asia on behalf of Hobart and William Smith to meet with and recruit students in

2012. This was definitely a leap from my role within the Admissions Office to something completely new and unfamiliar. Outside of Canada and Bermuda, I had never traveled internationally. Never in my wildest dreams did I imagine going to parts of the world I only saw in movies or read about in books. My trip was transformative! It made me want more, to learn about the people, their cultures, and most importantly to help those students seeking an education in the US.

Eight years later, I am now the Director of International Admissions. I spend between 5 to 7 weeks a year outside of the US meeting with potential Hobart and William Smith students. I've traveled throughout Asia, and in parts of Europe and Africa.

I attend college fairs, meet with college counselors, talk with families, interview students, and conduct informational sessions at high schools. I've met thousands of students who hope to study at an American college or university and provided mentorship and guidance to many of them along the way.

The work doesn't stop when I return to Geneva – that's where I begin to enlist the efforts of our wonderful Admissions ambassadors. After returning to campus, I work on filling in the blanks for students and their families who still have questions. The US college search can be overwhelming for a student from outside the US, and our current international students serve as crucial mentors and guides for the college search. I am truly thankful to have the support of current international students throughout the admissions process. We celebrate when students enroll and look forward to their arrival on campus in the fall, knowing that their hard work and ours was all worth it.
